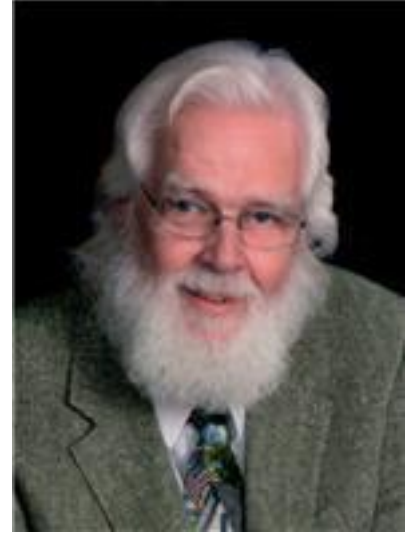

Grand Council

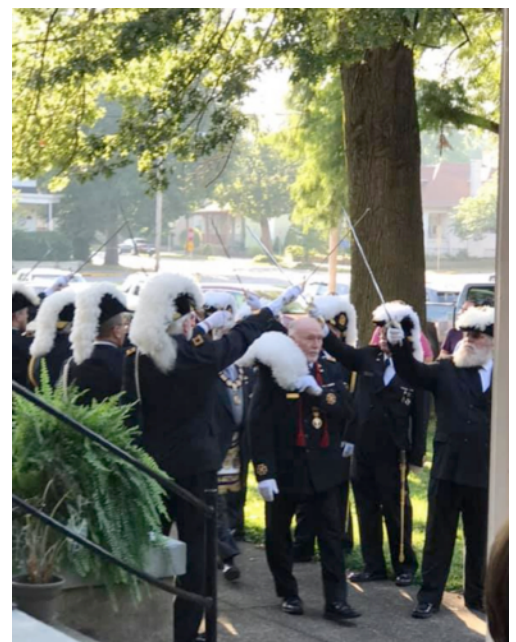

YOU helped send to the Holy Land!**

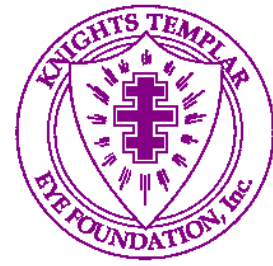

Some ways your donations are being used...

For our newer members and to refresh the memory of our more senior members, I would like to take a few moments to give you a brief history of the "Eye Foundation" and why it was created and how it operates today. From the Grand Encampment Web Site for the Eye Foundation:

The Knights Templar Eye Foundation, incorporated in 1956, is a charity sponsored by the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar.

The original mission of the Foundation was "to provide assistance to those who face loss of sight due to the need for surgical treatment without regard to race, color, creed, age, sex or national origin provided they are unable to pay or receive adequate assistance from current government agencies or similar sources and to provide funds for research in curing diseases of the eye."

On December 31, 2010, the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc., by direction of the board, shifted the Foundation's focus and adopted a new mission statement "to improve vision through research, education, and supporting access to care." The Foundation now only participates in direct patient care through the Seniors Eye Care Program in partnership with EyeCare America and the Foundation of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. With this change, the Foundation is benefitting untold millions in generations to come through grants that support research and education. Our research dollars have helped develop new, nonsurgical, treatments for strabismus (crossed eyes) and ophthalmologists have told us that our efforts in funding pediatric ophthalmology research have been the primary reason that there are fewer and fewer surgeries for strabismus. The Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc., annually announces its call for research grant applications. The Foundation invites eligible investigators to submit applications for pediatric ophthalmology research grants for the award period which normally runs from July 1 to June 30. From the applications received, the Scientific Advisory Committee recommends to the Trustees which requests should be funded.

Since its inception, the Foundation has expended over \$148 million on research, patient care, and education. Research grants totaling in excess of \$24 million have been awarded to researchers working in the fields of pediatric ophthalmology and ophthalmic genetics.

On May 29, 2019 we had the honor of presenting a "Career Starter Grant" in the amount of \$65,000.00 from the "Knights Templar Eye Foundation" to Raji Shyam, Phd. Doctor Shyam is a Post-Doctoral Fellow at the "Joseph Bonanno Laboratory" located at "Indiana University School of Optometry". She is researching the causes and possible treatment of **Congenital Hereditary Endothelia Dystrophy** or (CHED).

These grants are not easy to earn. This past year there were over 40 applications for Career Starter Grants nationwide. The applications are then reviewed by the "Knights Templar Eye Foundation Scientific Advisory Committee" which consists of 10 Physicians and Research Scientists, who then make recommendations as to who should receive the grant. There were only 20 grants presented this year. So, you can see this is a very competitive process.

In the 51st campaign which ended on May 15th, Indiana ranked 13th of all Grand Commanderies with a contribution of \$22,043.93. This is an average contribution of \$7.67 per member. For the 52nd campaign which began on June 1st, I would like to encourage each Commandery set a goal of only \$10.00 per member. This is only \$2.33 additional per member. The Foundation is exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501 (c) 3 of the Internal Revenue Code and contributions made to the Foundation are deductible by donors.

I want to thank the Sir Knights of Indiana for your continued strong support of the "Knights Templar Eye Foundation".

Indiana Grand Commandery Ritual Competition

Sir Knights All,

I am pleased to announce the first Indiana Grand Commandery Ritual Competition to be held at the Grand Conclave in Muncie, Indiana on Saturday, April 25th, 2020.

The competition is based on your command of the ritual for accuracy and delivery.

Three addresses in the Commandery Ritual have been chosen for this initial competition. The Junior Wardens Address, found on pages 113 and 114, the Prelate's Address, found on page 136 through the middle of page 138, and Ode to the Skull, found on page 131. You may choose to compete in one or all three addresses.

The only requirement is that you are a member in good standing of a Constituent Commandery of Indiana at the time of the Grand Commandery Conclave.

The registration form, complete rules, and information for this competition is attached to this Bulletin.

Registration forms must be completed and submitted by April 17, 2020. Forms are also available by contacting Ed Fodrea at hfa.phd1@gmail.com

2019-2020 Grand Commandery Ritual Competition

Eligibility: Any member of any Constituent Commandery of Indiana is eligible (any card-carrying member). Any Sir Knight can participate in one or all of the categories chosen this year. You do not have to hold that or any office in your Commandery.

Judging: Judging will consist of 3 judges. There will be 2 judges for the accuracy and 1 for the delivery.

The ritual judges will follow the ritual and score for accuracy (**wording MUST be exactly as in the ritual, word for word**).

Deductions as follows:

1 point off for each missed/added word.

10 points off for each time a prompt is requested by the competitor. Prompts will ONLY be given by request from the competitor.

The delivery judge will score the competitor on the manner in which the Sir Knight exemplifies the work, makes eye contact with the "candidate", remains calm and makes proper use of the props, etc.

The final score cards will be totaled by the Audit Committee. The Audit Committee's ruling will be final.

Each competitor will be allowed to give the lecture to a "candidate", but this is not required. If used, the "candidate" MUST be a Sir Knight. Any help or signage from this Sir Knight will result in a 50-point deduction.

The Junior Warden MUST be in Full Templar uniform and have any needed props.

The Prelate MUST be in Full Regalia OR Full Templar uniform together with all props (i.e., Bible, Cross, etc.)

The Ode to the Skull must be in Full Templar uniform or appropriate ceremonial costume.

Scoring is similar to Drill Competition. A base of 1000 points is the starting point for the competition.

In case of a tie the following method will be used to break it:

Ritual Work – 1st tie breaker

Delivery Work – 2nd tie breaker

Competitors will be placed in 15-minute blocks. Each competitor will be notified of his time slot via mail or e-mail by April 21, 2020. If a competitor is participating in the Drill Competition this will be considered in placing his time slot for the Ritual Competition.
